Dear Parents and Carers

Easter Sunday is the most important feast in the Church's year as it celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus and with it the Salvation and Redemption of us all. However, the celebration of the Church is not just confined to Easter Sunday. The Easter Season continues for the next six weeks giving us time to reacquaint ourselves with the Resurrection story and the appearances of the risen Jesus in the Gospels. We are able to reflect on the readings from the Acts of the Apostles where we see the apostles growing in strength as they begin to fully understand the teaching of Jesus during his ministry among them.

As Catholics we try to capture that early excitement and enthusiasm that the early Christians must have felt and how faith and belief can be applied to our world now. Traditionally the Pope addresses the world with his 'Urbi et Orbi' — 'To the City and the World' message on Easter Sunday. This year given the situation the world is facing it was delivered to an empty St. Peter's Square in Rome, when normally it is packed with pilgrims from across the world. In his address where he spoke about how the lives of millions around the world have suddenly changed he said:

'This is not a time for indifference....

This is not a time for self-centredness.....

This is not a time for division......

This is not a time for forgetfulness....'

Gospel Reflection - Third Sunday of Easter - Luke 24:13-35

The Eucharist is about giving thanks. We give thanks for the gift of Jesus, which is the gift of himself.

Up until now the risen Jesus had revealed himself to people we know well from the gospels – Mary of Magdala, the disciples in the upper room, Thomas and to Peter and John. These are important figures in the history of the Church,

however the revelation on the Road to Emmaus perhaps eclipses all the others as it confirms that the message of Salvation that Jesus brought from God the Father is for all of us no matter who we are. Each one of us regardless of status can recognise our Saviour in the Eucharist, just as these two disciples – unknown to us – recognised him when he "took the bread and said the blessing; then broke it and handed it them".
